"I had this internal world of fighting and friendship, and all the excitement, all the things I didn't have in this world," Emily said. "And I continued to live in that world more and more, and be in the real world with my family less and less."

Anne Huff, Emily's mom, decided to pull Emily out of public school in middle school and send her to a private school for students with mental illness. "It was only in an atmosphere that was both therapeutic and academic," Anne said, "that Emily could begin to really learn."

I am in a doctor's office, and they are talking like they know every single thing about schizophrenia that is to be known. They don't! I'm like, 'You don't understand anything. When you have seven people living in your head, then we can talk.

- What characteristics did Emily most want people to know about her? How do you think she could have been supported in general education so that her school community could really know and appreciate her qualities?
- Have you or a family member experienced a significant emotional or mental illness? If so, what were the challenges faced?
