Standard 1: United States territorial expansion between 1801 and 1861, and how it affected relations with external powers and Native Americans

BACKGROUND

During the mid 1800's scores of people living in the northeast made the decision to move their families west of the Mississippi River in hopes of making a better life. Much of this new land did not belong to the United States. The decision to move was something that did not come easily, considering the dangers that lay ahead, the distance that needed to be traveled, and the uncertainty of what was in store once they arrived.

SCENARIO

The year is 1839 and Josiah Smith and his fellow farmers have been noticing that their little valley in western Pennsylvania is becoming crowded, as people from Europe continue to immigrate to the United States. Not only are more people moving to this peaceful valley, but also rumors have spread that the owners of some new so-called factory is coming to buy valuable farmland. Josiah and others fear that all these new comers will rob their young sons of finding suitable farmland in the future.

Josiah rides into town for supplies and joins in a conversation with other locals from the area. He hears talk that one of the local farmers, Samuel Anderson, is leaving the valley in the spring heading west. The news comes as a surprise to Josiah, but it also sounds intriguing. Stories of both the great open farmland as well as reports of the treacherous journey are mixed into the conversation. Josiah leaves town making one big decision, but he needs to present the option to his wife and family. He knows that his wife will be filled with questions like:

- How do we get there?
- How long is this journey?
- What do we take?
- What 's at the end of the journey?
- What are the dangers of going?
- Have others made the trip and found it worthwhile?

The Smith family will need to find these answers before undertaking such an adventure.

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TASKS

You also need to include the accounts of different individuals that have made the trip so that future travelers know what to expect.
