



Brenda Peterson is the author of 18 books, which range from her first memoir *Build Me an Ark: A Life with Animals*, to five novels, one of which, *Duck and Cover*, was chosen by *New York Times* as a Notable Book of the Year. Her nonfiction books include *Living by Water* and the National Geographic book *Sightings: The Gray Whale's Mysterious Journey*. These works established Peterson as a prominent creative nonfiction writer, extensively profiled in the reference work *America's Nature Writers*. Her nonfiction has appeared in numerous national newspapers, journals, and magazines, including *The New York Times*, *Chicago Tribune*, *San Francisco Chronicle*, *Reader's Digest*, *Christian Science Monitor*, *O: The Oprah Magazine*, and *Utne Reader*. She is a book reviewer for *New York Journal of Books*, *The Seattle Weekly*, and *The Huffington Post*.

Peterson lives in Seattle. Since 1993 she has contributed commentary to NPR and is a frequent commentator on *The Huffington Post*. Her children's book, *Leopard and Silkie: One Boy's Quest to Save the Seal Pups*, is among the winners of the National Science Teachers' Association "Outstanding Science Book for K-12". The Early Reader version, *Seal Pup Rescue*, was just selected for Scholastic Book Fairs. Her fifth novel, *The Drowning World*, is now out. It was hailed by Diane Ackerman as "Glorious imagination . . . quickly lures you deep beneath the waves."
